# WE'RE AT A NEW BEGINNING

As in past years, this issue of the ANERA Newsletter is mainly a report on ANERA's activities during the past fiscal year (July 1, 1976-June 30, 1977). It has been delayed because of important developments at ANERA—a new President, the moving of the AMER Medical Division office from New York City to ANERA's office in Washington, D.C., the Annual Board Meeting, and a flood of mail—which have all taken place over the past couple of months. This issue of the Newsletter is a report to you—Americans concerned with the human rights of the Palestinian people.

But before beginning this report of ANERA's activities in fiscal year 1977 and new developments in fiscal year 1978, we want to tell you about something very important.

This fall ANERA sent out a mailing about the human rights of the Palestinian people to over 200,000 Americans. This mailing, combined with the recent statements of concern for Palestinian human rights expressed by the American Government, has resulted in a deluge of donations and letters of support for ANERA from a broad spectrum of the American people.

From your letters, we know you are neither anti-Israel nor do you agree with everything the Palestinians have to say. You are people who are concerned about human rights. You are concerned that the Palestinians have been treated unfairly in the past; you are concerned that they have been denied even a part of their historic homeland and the rights that go with such a homeland...rights like self-determination, life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. You seem to think the Palestinians and their rights as human beings should be given more attention by our own government and the world at large.

While your letters of concern have been flooding ANERA's office, something else has been happening elsewhere in Washington, D.C. Right now, offices of government officials are being flooded with letters of a different type...letters criticizing our government's efforts to give more attention to the human rights of the Palestinians. These letters are having a tremendous impact. If our government is to continue its policy of concern for Palestinian human rights, government officials need to hear from you. Your support is needed right now.

The best way of letting our Government know of your concern for Palestinian human rights is by writing thoughtful letters and telegrams or by telephoning government offices, stating your own views whatever they may be, about Palestinian human rights. For 30 years the human rights of the Palestinians have been overshadowed by other concerns in the Middle East. Now the subject is beginning to get the thoughtful attention the Palestinians deserve.

We're at the beginning...this won't be the last time your support is needed. We're at the beginning...and now is the time to begin standing up for human rights for the Palestinian people.

## **ANERA'S NINTH ANNUAL BOARD MEETING**

On September 17, 1977, the Ninth Annual Meeting of the ANERA Board of Directors was held at the University Club in Washington, D.C. An informal dinner and discussion meeting at the College of Preachers, Washington National (Episcopal) Cathedral was held the evening of September 16 for Board Members and their spouses.

At the Ninth Annual Meeting, the Directors elected new Board Members, ANERA's Officers and Members of the Projects, Executive, and Medical Committees. The Directors also reviewed the past year's activity and approved ANERA's policies and budget for the

coming year.

John P. Richardson, who began working for ANERA in 1968 as Executive Director, had announced his intention to resign as ANERA's President at the Ninth Annual Meeting. At the evening discussion meeting, Mr. Richardson was presented with a plaque commemorating his 9 years of service. The Board expressed gratitude for his work with ANERA and best wishes in his new position as Director of Public Affairs for the National Association of Arab Americans. Mr. Richardson will remain with ANERA as a Member of the Board of Directors.

The Board's discussion of ANERA's work in the Gaza Strip and West Bank was greatly assisted by Henry Selz, ANERA's Middle East Representative located in Jerusalem, who was present by invitation at the Board Meeting. Special attention was given to ANERA's

program in the Occupied Territories and to potential projects during the coming year.

In his policy statement to the Board of Directors, Chairman Evan M. Wilson remarked, "Since it is not likely that an overall settlement of the Middle East conflict will be achieved in the months to come, ANERA will have to maintain its operations in the West Bank and Gaza Strip within the context of ongoing military occupation. Therefore, we will continue functioning as we have been, maintaining an essentially correct relationship with the Israeli authorities and concentrating on the kind of projects—both humanitarian and developmental—that have been characteristic of our recent program...the overall stability of the West Bank/Gaza Strip can be aided by ANERA's developmental efforts...only a stable and strong West Bank/Gaza Strip can make a significant contribution to the future of the region."

## **ANERA'S NEW PRESIDENT**

ANERA is pleased to announce the selection of Dr. Peter Gubser as the organization's new President. Well-qualified for his new position with ANERA, Dr. Gubser most recently served as the Assistant Representative of the Ford Foundation in Beirut, Lebanon and Amman, Jordan.

At the Ford Foundation, Dr. Gubser's responsibilities included working with other professional staff and local consultants in project and program development and management and co-ordinating Foundation activities with other foreign assistance agencies such as the U.S. Agency for International Development, U.N. organs and with local institutions and governments. He also helped develop and manage social science grants in the Middle East and participated in social analysis for the Foundation's Middle East headquarters.

Prior to joining the Ford Foundation, Dr. Gubser was an Associate Research Scientist with American Institutes for Research, a non-profit Washington-based organization. In pursuit of his studies in the Middle East, Dr. Gubser spent 15 months in Zahlah, Lebanon, conducting field research on the town's socio-political structure and dynamics and 12 months in Al-Karak, Jordan, conducting field research on politics and change in the area. Material from both studies has been published in the form of a book and articles for Middle East-related journals.

Dr. Gubser graduated from St. Antony's College, Oxford University, Great Britain in January, 1970, with a D. Phil. in Social Studies (politics). His thesis topic was "Power and Politics in a Small Arab Town—A Study of Al-Karak."

Dr. Gubser also received a M.A. in Middle Eastern Studies from the American University of Beirut, Lebanon in June, 1966, and his B.A. in Political Science from Yale University in 1964.

Born in Tulsa, Oklahoma in May, 1941, Dr. Gubser is married to Annie Yeni-Komshian Gubser, a school teacher and daughter of Dr. Hovsep Yeni-Komshian, a long-time medical doctor and professor at the American University of Beirut. The Gubsers and their two daughters, Sasha and Christine, live in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Gubser's selection was approved by the Board of Directors at its Ninth Annual Meeting, September 17, 1977. In assuming his new duties, Dr. Gubser remarked. "ANERA obviously performs a much needed service for the Palestinians, both those in a refugee and non-refugee status. Helping people who are seriously oppressed in not only a political sense but also in their social and economic lives, is a humanitarian task of concern to the American people. In my new position with ANERA, I hope to help the ANERA Board of Directors and staff facilitate the execution of this task, seeing that necessary aid from the U.S. reaches the Palestinians and that Americans are aware of the plight of these people."

Although Dr. Gubser has only been with us a short time, he has already won the respect and affection of his colleagues at ANERA.

## **ANERA GRANTS, FISCAL YEAR 1977**

In fiscal year 1977, ANERA gave a total of \$639,771 (\$554,515 in grants and \$85,256 in gifts in kind) to projects primarily assisting Palestinians in the Middle East. This is nearly \$28,000 more than was given in fiscal year 1976. The following projects received ANERA assistance in FY 1977:



## **NEW BOOKS**

In response to the urging of his colleagues, Dr. John H. Davis, ANERA's Chairman Emeritus, has updated his well-known book. The Evasive Peace: A Study of the Zionist-Arab Problem. Dr. Davis is a former Assistant Secretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and former Commissioner-General of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA) for Palestinian Refugees. His book reflects his first-hand knowledge of the plight of the Palestinians and The Evasive Peace has been described as a "perceptive and clear-cut analysis" of the Middle East crisis. The Palestinians: Portrait of a People in Conflict, by Frank H. Epp with photographs by John Goddard, has often been guoted in the ANERA Newsletter. Dr. Epp has long been associated with the Middle East and is now President of Conrad Grebel College at the Univer sity of Waterloo, Ontario, Canada.
