Building a Foundation for the Future

In ANERA's last newsletter, we announced our 35th Anniversary Campaign to raise \$15 million to expand programs in the West Bank, Gaza, Lebanon, and Jordan (for an update on our progress, see page 5). These programs include economic development, health and education. In this issue, we highlight a small sample of ANERA's education projects supported through the Campaign.

After decades of conflict, the challenges confronting education in this region are vast: dilapidated schools; interrupted semesters; trauma caused by violence; and grinding poverty. Government ministries and local organizations need funds to meet basic educational needs as well as to build essential long-term services.

To meet these challenges, ANERA broadens educational opportunities and helps create a more competitive trained workforce. Additionally, ANERA promotes after-school education, which is still in its formative stages in the region, and gives the poor and the handicapped access to quality programs. It also expands state-of-the-art information technology programs that provide affordable, professional training, leading to well paying jobs and increased investment opportunities.

ANERA partners with local educational institutions to improve and expand education opportunities in the West Bank, Gaza, Lebanon and Jordan. In these societies this crucial investment helps create conditions for a more peaceful and prosperous future.

Music Education

Music, as a fine art, has unparalleled educational and psychological value to people of all ages. ANERA is working to promote and strengthen music education throughout the West Bank and Gaza. With this goal in mind, ANERA has partnered with the National Conservatory of Music – Palestine.

The Conservatory offers programs in music education, performance, curriculum development, and teacher training at its three locations in Ramallah, Jerusalem, and Bethlehem. It also hosts a concert series and has been

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Preschool Milk Distribution

Malnutrition is a growing problem for Palestinian families in the West Bank and Gaza Strip. A recent study conducted by Johns Hopkins University found that chronic and acute malnutrition is widespread among children less than five years of age and is increasing rapidly. In Gaza, over 30% of children screened suffer from chronic or acute malnutrition. Children, whose developing bodies are especially sensitive to a lack of needed protein, vitamins, and minerals in their diet, are the most vulnerable to malnutrition.

Communities that traditionally suffer from poverty have been especially hard hit. According to the U.S. Agency for International Development, approximately 50% of all Palestinians require external food assistance to help meet their minimum daily caloric intake. Unfortunately, the number of Palestinian households requiring food assistance increases daily.

Rural areas are the most vulnerable in the face of the closures that have been imposed. The livelihoods of Palestinian farmers, fishermen and unskilled workers have been severely disrupted, preventing them from supplying food and earning income.

With the drastic increase in child malnutrition, ANERA, with seed funding provided by the National Arab-American Medical Association – NJ Chapter, has launched a special initiative in Gaza to provide the neediest Palestinian pre-school children one free box of milk every day for three months.

ANERA will purchase milk from the Al-Safa Milk Factory in Nablus, which is the only large-scale supplier of milk, yoghurt, and cheese in Palestine. The factory employs more than twenty persons, and purchases milk from small dairy farms in the villages surrounding Nablus.

Since the most recent upsurge in violence in April 2002, ANERA staff has managed the distribution of over one million dollars in food and six million dollars of in-kind medical supplies to local governmental and non-governmental organizations throughout the West Bank and Gaza. In addition, we have funded special meal and supplemental nutrition programs supported by many donors. The distribution of milk in Gaza preschools is ANERA's latest response to the humanitarian emergency and deteriorating health situation in the West Bank and Gaza. ▀





Maghazi Community Center

Most Palestinian children, especially those in refugee camps, attend school in half-day shifts. Because structured activities and recreational facilities are rare, children traditionally have nowhere to go before or after school. Opportunities for Palestinian students to supplement their formal education are in great need.

With the help of the Pearl S. Buck Foundation, ANERA has established an Educational Enhancement Center in the Maghazi Refugee Camp to provide a safe and intellectually challenging environment to children and youth during non-school hours.

Recently, the Maghazi Center opened a new computer lab, funded by ANERA with Rotary Club support, that helps youth in and around the camp gain valuable computer skills. Without this exposure to information technology, these young people are limited in their range of career options, leaving most with futures as poorly paid laborers. Having more young people trained in information technology will help the economic development of the entire region. ▶

Said Khoury Information Technology Center of Excellence at Al-Quds University

Training young people for high quality jobs is the mission of the Said Khoury Information Technology Center of Excellence at Al-Quds University. Laying the corner stone of the new Center, Dr. Sari Nusseibeh, President of Al-Quds University, and Dr. Peter Gubser, President of ANERA, dedicated the Center to the youth of Palestine, and to their future.

When completed, the Center will:

- ▶ train about two hundred youth each year to write software and prepare for future jobs
- ▶ house a business incubator program to help entrepreneurs realize their business ambition
- ▶ include a job placement and networking unit to assist information technology (IT) graduates in locating employment
- ▶ cooperate with a special fund that provides loans to students who need financial assistance.

The Center is named in honor of Said Khoury the president and co-founder of Consolidated Contractors International Company and commonly referred to as CCC. They generously donated the funds to build and establish the Center at Al-Quds University in cooperation with ANERA. Fawzi Kawash, the former Executive Vice President of CCC and now an advisor to the shareholders and a current ANERA Board Member, was instrumental in making this project possible. ▶

Scholarship Program

Soon after being founded in 1968, ANERA began providing scholarship grants to the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA) to help refugees of the 1967 war obtain vocational training. Today ANERA's Scholarship Program continues offering hope to hundreds of children at schools in the West Bank, Gaza, Lebanon, and Jordan.

Each year ANERA's Scholarship Program helps over 200 poor, orphaned, and handicapped children receive a quality education at seven schools in the West Bank, Gaza, Jordan and Lebanon. The cost of each scholarship, \$175 per student, provides these children with books and other school supplies, food, clothing, medical care, trained teachers, and well-maintained classrooms.

Literacy Campaign for Working Children

Children in post-war Lebanon live under extremely difficult conditions. The number of orphans, displaced, disabled, and working children has risen drastically in the past eight years.

Child labor is reported as one of the most pressing social problems in Lebanon. Large numbers of working children are found in urban neighborhoods of major cities as well as remote rural areas. Northern Lebanon has the highest proportion of working children (10–17 years old), and the poor urban neighborhood of Bab Tebbaneh in Tripoli is one of the most affected areas.

While it is difficult to completely eliminate child labor, ANERA strives to find ways to reduce its negative impact on the children now and in the future. We offer a second chance to receive an education that will empower them to build their future.

In Bab Tebbaneh, ANERA supports a literacy program for working children, carried out by the Rene Moawad Foundation. Due to the poverty in the neighborhood, schools are too expensive for destitute children, many with 8–10 siblings, who live in cramped and unhygienic conditions.

Literacy classes enable these children to continue their education and acquire basic reading, writing and math skills. Extracurricular activities such as field trips to historic sites and the beach also are part of their program. All children receive counseling and are encouraged to attend classes regularly and perform well academically. Teachers and social workers make home visits to report on the students' progress and build parental support for the program so vital to their children's future. ▀
