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Childhood Denied?

Palestinian children are the innocent victims of the economic, social and health conditions around them. Nearly six out of ten families in the West Bank and Gaza live below the United Nations' poverty line. They eke out a living on less than \$2 a day. Malnutrition and ill health badly affect children under five, many of whom suffer from anemia. The stress of their violent surroundings often leads to disrupted schooling, which presents a critical challenge for the future of Palestinian society and leadership.

The most vulnerable are preschoolers at a time when they are developing their cognitive, social, emotional, and physical abilities. Experts say the lack of vital stimulation, health, nutrition, education, and quality care in the early years can compromise the life chances and economic prospects of an entire future generation.

This newsletter issue proudly details and celebrates ANERA's Early Childhood Development program *Right Start!*. The project began a few years ago on a small scale and has recently been awarded a two-year, multi-million dollar grant to expand from the West Bank to Gaza.

But how does a project like *Right Start!* start?

As is so often the case with ANERA projects, it all began with one donor – a person who was and remains committed to strengthening the education of Palestinian children. This person, who has insisted on anonymity, stepped forward to give a gift that would kick-start ANERA's efforts and encourage other gifts as well.

Those initial funds allowed ANERA to conduct assessments, carry out pilot projects, hire Palestinian educational specialists and create the expertise to merit a multi-million dollar grant.

ANERA is grateful for donors who are willing to make that first gift; the gift that gives every project a right start.

Right Start! in Gaza

ANERA won a \$2.6 million USAID grant, managed by Mercy Corps, for *Right Start!*, a two-year program which will build upon our experience with early childhood development, enhancing the well-being of children in Gaza who are six-years-old and under. ANERA will

- provide preschool teachers, community workers, and parents with the knowledge and skills to foster proper childhood development;
- upgrade and equip preschools and community centers with vital resources and materials to enhance teaching and learning;
- and deliver community-based ECD activities to enable children to learn and thrive.

Right Start! will focus its support on 90 preschools and 25 community centers in Gaza's poorest communities which will affect over 170,000 children and 96,000 community members.

These facts are not a secret and yet little has been done to address the problem. There are challenges to be sure. By far the greatest challenge is financial. With more pressing financial priorities, a lack of public investment has limited access to preschool education for Palestinian children. There are only two government-funded preschools in the West Bank, which serve a mere 120 children. Most of the private preschools that do exist are considered inadequate for the care and education of children.

Limited funding also affects the morale and attitudes of preschool teachers, who often earn a fraction of their primary school counterparts. The majority of preschool teachers are unqualified and poorly paid. Families often lack basic child care and development knowledge and skills.

In a unique partnership formed in 2009, the Ministry of Education approved a multi-year initiative under ANERA's leadership to map out a strategy for Early Childhood Development (ECD) for Palestinian society. It brings together teachers, parents and the community to promote quality education for the children of the West Bank and Gaza.

Two years later, the ambitious program has more than achieved some of its preliminary objectives. It has provided high quality training and mentorship for preschool teachers offering children creative and active learning opportunities to enhance their overall

development instead of the traditional rote method that stunts a child's natural abilities.

ANERA ECD Program Coordinator Sulaima Abu-El-Haj, together with leading Palestinian childhood trainers, has developed and facilitated many hours of training and mentoring preschool teachers on the fundamentals of early childhood care and education including child development, child rights, learning theories, safety, classroom organization, expressive arts, play and much more.

To expand the horizon for child development, last summer ANERA developed and facilitated a series of Arts for Childhood workshops and summer camps. The purpose was to get children and their parents involved in a creative art and music program that both develops the child's cognitive and creative skills but also provided a safe, stress-free haven for children during the summer months when school is not in session. On the horizon: a national reading program, Hayya Naqra'! (Let's Read!) aims to develop and distribute high quality children's books that can broaden a child's horizon and fuel their imagination.

But all this takes more than dreams and plans. It requires a commitment and investment by educators, parents and the community who together recognize that quality education is the key to a productive and vibrant society. And, with more funding, so much more can be done!
